



Juneteenth was recognized as a federal holiday on June 17, 2021, when President Joe Biden signed the Juneteenth National Independence Day Act into law. Please note that all Arlington municipal offices will be closed on Monday June 20th, in observance of the holiday on the 19th.

What is Juneteenth?

Juneetenth, originally called Emancipation Day and sometimes called Freedom Day, commemorates June 19th 1865, the day Gordon Granger, a general in the Union army, arrived in Galveston, Texas with the proclamation that announced the end of slavery in Texas. Black Texans have historically celebrated the day since the 1800's. The Texas diaspora, the migration of Texans throughout U.S. cities, spread the holiday across the country. Juneteenth celebrations are a time for communities to come together to celebrate with food, parades, pageants and music and to reflect on the past as well as what freedom means today and the future. In the words of activist and author Angela Davis: "today on Juneteenth, the day we celebrate the end of slavery, the day we memorialize those who offered us hope for the future and the day when we renew our commitment to the struggle for freedom."
